Robert Marcus qualified in Medicine at University College Hospital Medical School in 1977. After general medical training leading to MRCP, he specialised in Haematology at UCH, Hammersmith and Royal Free Hospitals. He was appointed Consultant Haematologist at Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge in 1987 where he established the East Anglia Bone Marrow Transplant service and participated in the first trials of the CAMPATH series of monoclonal antibodies in lymphoma and CLL He became Clinical Director of the BCSH pioneering novel approaches to guideline development

Subsequently he became CI in a number of practice changing studies in lymphoma notably the R CVP trial that established the role of anti-CD20 antibodies in the therapy of Follicular lymphoma, and later the GALLIUM Trial that established the role of the novel anti-CD20 antibody Obinutuzumab in Follicular Lymphoma

In 2008 he relocated to Kings College Hospital where he developed further subspeciality expertise in HIV related, post transplant and cerebral lymphoma, was co-author of numerous publications, as well as developing novel agent clinical trials and contributing to new national guidelines in Follicular, CNS and Post Transplant Lymphomas

Dr Marcus is vice president of Leukaemia Care and was senior editor and contributor to "The Lymphomas" and co-editor for "Myeloma and Related Disorders" both published by Cambridge University Press and is a contributing author to the new editions of "Post Graduate Haematology" and "The Oxford Handbook of Clinical Trials"

After 40 years service Dr Marcus retired from the NHS in July 2017 and now practices privately within HCA Healthcare at LOC Harley St and London Bridge at Guys
